Preliminary Draft of the NJ State Development and Redevelopment Plan - Open for Public Comment

From the NJ Department of Environmental Protection (DEP): "The NJ State Planning Commission recently unveiled their preliminary update to the NJ State Development and Redevelopment Plan [available here: https://tinyurl.com/4ke74wfx]. The preliminary update provides a roadmap to how NJ will continue to address critical challenges that the state faces, including climate change, equity, housing affordability, infrastructure modernization, and economic development. Residents can provide feedback on the draft plan by filling out [a] survey [available here: https://tinyurl.com/mu52n7kv] or by emailing comments directly to **stateplan.comments@sos.nj.gov**." Public comments can be submitted at any time during the Cross-Acceptance process, which culminates with the State Planning Commission meeting (anticipated to be in December of 2025) at which the vote will take place to adopt the final version of the Plan. To ensure adequate time for comments to be considered, however, the Office of Planning Advocacy recommends submitting them by April 16, while the county public information meetings are still taking place (see below). "Energy Capital, Discursive Power and the Shaping of Energy Futures" - Webinar 3/3/2025, 12:00 p.m. - 1:00 p.m.

NJBPU Net Metering Policies for Class I Renewable Energy Systems Policy Comments Due 3/3/2025

The NJ Board of Public Utilities (BPU) held a Technical Conference for stakeholders to present their perspectives on possible designs of a net energy metering ("NEM") successor policy in NJ. "Net metering permits owners and operators of class I renewable energy generation facilities to receive credits for any electricity that is supplied back to the electric grid. In New Jersey, net metering is predominantly utilized for solar installations at residential, commercial, and public entity locations. Net metering must be offered at non-discriminatory rates to accommodate systems of any sized capacity." A Technical Conference was held 2/10/2025; the presentations from the Technical Conference will be taken into consideration when the BPU develops a shortlist of potential NEM successor policy options in the subsequent phase of this stakeholder process.

NJ Climate Superfund Act Assembly Lobby Day 3/10/2025, 12:00 p.m. - 4:00 p.m. Trenton, NJ - In-person

This event is sponsored by EmpowerNJ, a coalition of which **UUFANJ is a member**. "It's been [over] two months since the NJ Climate Superfund Act received its first hearing and vote in the New Jersey Legislature, when it passed the Senate Environment Committee on Dec. 12. Now, it looks like this crucial legislation might start moving in the Assembly, and we plan to be there to see it through! The Assembly Environment Committee is holding a meeting on March 10, and with 4 out of 7 members on the Committee as sponsors of the NJ Climate Superfund Act, there's simply no good reason it shouldn't be heard and passed out of Committee on that date. Join us on March 10th to call on the Assembly Environment Committee and the NJ legislature as a whole to pass the NJ Climate Superfund Act. While the main event is in the afternoon, you can also join us early at 10:30 AM to lobby legislators outside of the morning committees!

From EmpowerNJ: "The NJ Climate Superfund Act (S3545/A4696) would make New Jersey more affordable by shifting the costs of climate destruction from consumers, taxpayers and ratepayers to NJ's largest most significant corporate polluters most responsible for the emissions causing the damage (oil, gas, and coal producers and refiners, think the Exxons of the world) and providing roughly \$1 billion / year for municipal resiliency and mitigation projects to build back stronger and reduce the risk of more climate destruction in the future." "From Individual Behavior to Collective Action: Behavior Change in the Climate Crisis" - Webinar 3/10/2025, 2:55 p.m. - 4:10 p.m.

This webinar, part of the Cornell Atkinson Center for Sustainability "Perspectives on the Climate Change Challenge" Seminars, will be presented by Dr. Neil Lewis, Jr., "a Nancy and Peter Meinig Family Investigator in the Life Sciences, and Associate Professor of Communication, Medicine, and Public Policy at Cornell University and Weill

Cornell Medicine. His research examines how people's social contexts and identities influence how they make sense of the world around them, and the implications of those meaning-making processes for their motivation to pursue a variety of goals in life." Abstract: "Climate change is fundamentally a collective problem - the issue will affect everyone in some way. Because of this, behavioral scientists have studied a variety of ways to get people from a broad range of backgrounds to engage with the issue of climate change; they have done this in attempts to mitigate (or adapt to) the climate crisis. Some have taken individual-focused approaches that target individual level behavioral changes, others have taken more collective approaches attempting to mobilize large groups of people. In this talk [Dr. Lewis] will present research on the efficacy of these different strategies, and their implications for interventions and policies to address the climate crisis." Comment Period Open for NJDEP 2025/2026 Forest Management Activities in Sparta Mountain WMA Forest Stewardship Plan Comments Due 3/31/2025

As announced by the NJ Department of Environmental Protection (DEP): "In accordance with the 2021 Addendum [available here: <u>https://dep.nj.gov/njfw/wp-</u> <u>content/uploads/njfw/sparta-fsp-addendum-final-7-9-</u> <u>21.pdf</u>], forest management activities planned for next year (2025/26) is (sic) now open for comment. **Please email comments to**

dship plan.pdf], forest management activities in the form of a modified seed tree prescription will be implemented on 10 acres within Stand 18 next fall/winter (November 2025 - March 2026). This prescription will likely retain around 20 sq. ft. of basal area per acre across the 10-acre site to allow for the growth of young oak and hickory trees, blackberries, sedges, and a variety of other native shrub and sapling plants. This will also create breeding and/or foraging habitat for the 80 different bird species that have been observed using other managed sites on Sparta Mountain WMA. Trees to be retained will likely be the codominant or dominant size classes that are of good vigor for longevity. In some instances we may retain clusters of trees – some of which may not fit the above description if they have high wildlife value (i.e. stems with advanced decay, cavities or exfoliating bark). Desirable trees that are underrepresented in the area (e.g. white oak and black cherry) may also be retained for diversity purposes. Additionally, white ash stems that do not already exhibit characteristics of Emerald Ash Borer infestation may be preserved to retain genetic diversity in the event those individuals are resistant to the insect." NJDEP EJMAP Tool Update

The NJ Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) announced an update of certain parameters of its Environmental Justice Mapping, Assessment and Protection (EJMAP) tool (available here: <u>https://experience.arcgis.com/experience/548632a235</u> <u>1b41b8a0443cfc3a9f4ef6</u>) that is used for any permit application that is subject to the NJ EJ Law. Permit applications submitted on or after 1/31/25 must use the new stressor data layer for analysis. The DEP updated the EJMAP with new Overburden Community(OBC)/Adjacent block group (ABG) determinations based on the 2023 American Community Survey (ACS) and any new stressor data made publicly available since its 7/31/24, release. [Note: the Federal Climate and Economic Justice Screening Tool (CEJST) was taken down from the federal website on 1/20/2025; a version of it that has been restored by scientists is available here: <u>https://tinyurl.com/5t2fhxbs</u>. The scientists' website states, "We are working on an overhaul, but in the meantime some links and text may incorrectly suggest that this site is affiliated with the US Government."]



Murphy Administration Announces Availability of \$35 Million for Local Government Vehicle Electrification Projects

From Gov. Murphy's press release: "The Murphy Administration today [2/7/2025] announced the availability of \$35 million in grants to help local governments electrify their shuttle, school bus and truck fleets to protect public health and the environment, leveraging proceeds from New Jersey's participation in the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI). The new funding is for the replacement of diesel vehicles owned by, or serving, local towns including shuttles, transit buses, garbage trucks, dump trucks and small school buses."

NJEDA Board Approves Programs to Expand Number of Zero Emission Medium and Heavy-Duty Vehicles on NJ Roadways

From the press release: "The New Jersey Economic Development Authority (NJEDA) Board yesterday approved two programs aimed at putting more zero emissions vehicles on roads across the state.... The Board approved Phase III of NJ ZIP, which will provide vouchers to businesses and institutional organizations to offset the cost of purchasing new, zero emission medium and heavy-duty vehicles. The size of vouchers awarded through Phase III, which is funded at \$75 million, will vary depending on the class of vehicle being purchased, from a minimum of \$15,000 for Class 2b vehicles to \$175,000 for Class 8 vehicles. Bonuses will be available for school busses, small businesses; women-, minority-, and veteranowned businesses. Additionally, 50 percent of funds will be set aside for applications from small businesses in Overburdened Communities (OBCs).... the Board also approved a new, \$25 million program known as the NJ ZEV Financing Program, which is a loan program to support businesses adopting medium and heavy-duty zero emission vehicles. The program complements NJ ZIP by offering financing for vehicle costs that may not be met by NJ ZIP vouchers or other available grant funding resources. Loans will also be available through the program for business not utilizing the NJ ZIP program.... Trump Administration Freezes Billions for Electric Vehicle Chargers

In 12/2024, the New Jersey Department of Transportation (NJDOT) announced the award of a \$20.96 million contract to build EV charging stations at 19 locations along NJDOT-maintained Interstate Highways, using Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) National Electric Vehicle Infrastructure (NEVI) Formula Program funds. On 2/6/2025, the FHWA sent a memo (available here: https://www.fhwa.dot.gov/environment/nevi/resources /state-plan-approval-suspension.pdf) to states informing them that the underlying guidance used to approve NEVI plans has been rescinded and all State plans previously approved are suspended until new guidance is issued and new plans are approved, and no new obligations may take place. FERC Reinstates Transco Gas Pipeline Approval

In 2023, a coalition of environmental organizations, backed by eight state Attornevs General and the NJ Ratepayer Advocate, appealed the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission's (FERC) approval of a Williams Co. subsidiary's Regional Energy Access Expansion (REAE) project, which was planned to expand natural gas compressor stations in Branchburg and Old Bridge and build a new natural gas compressor station in West Deptford, plus 36.1 miles of pipeline in PA. In July 2024, a U.S. Court of Appeals vacated FERC's certificate of approval and remanded the case to FERC "for appropriate action." FERC has now reinstated its approval of the pipeline project. In addition, FERC has ended its ongoing proceeding related to "Consideration of Greenhouse Gas [GHG] Emissions in Natural Gas Infrastructure." It had issued a draft policy statement outlining a procedure, but now has

Fourth Ironbound Power Plant a 'Slap in the Face,' Newark Mayor Says

The NJ Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) has given approval to the Passaic Valley Sewerage Commission (PVSC) to begin construction of its gas-fired power plant. Only one more final permit is needed - a federal air permit - which is now under a 45-day review by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). New Bill in the New Jersey Legislature Aims to Simplify Solar Permitting for Homeowners

A bill (S1400/A5264) has been introduced in the NJ legislature that would require local governments to adopt instant solar permitting for residential rooftop solar. The bill "Requires establishment of [an] automated platform to expedite construction code approval of applications to install residential solar energy systems." According to the bill, NJ has the fifth slowest known solar permitting timelines of any state in the country, and approximately one-infive residential solar energy installation projects are cancelled after submission of an application for a permit which, according to solar energy system installers, is largely a direct result of frustration experienced in attempting to maneuver through New Jersey's permitting process. The bill would establish a "State Smart Solar Permitting Platform" - an internet-based platform that, consistent with construction codes, "automates

plan review, produces a code-compliant approval, and instantly releases a permit or permit revision in response to the receipt of an acceptable application to construct a residential solar energy system."

Applications for NJEDA's Feed NJ Program Now Open

From the press release: "The New Jersey Economic Development Authority's (NJEDA) Food Equity and Economic Development in New Jersey (FEED NJ) Program is now accepting applications. FEED NJ is a \$30 million pilot program awarding grants between \$50,000 and \$500,000 for innovative projects that strengthen food access and food security in New Jersey's most acute Food Desert Communities (FDCs).... FEED NJ will provide grants... to cover up to 100 percent of costs for projects aimed at improving New Jersey residents' ability to access fresh, affordable, and healthy food in one or more of 14 Primary Focus FDCs.... Eligible applicants must be for-profit or non-profit entities that have been in existence for at least two years at the time of the application. Projects must primarily serve residents of one or more of the 14 Primary Focus FDCs..... Applications for FEED NJ are now open, and are due by Thursday, April 3, 2025, at 5:00 p.m."

Second Partner Exits Embattled Atlantic Shores Offshore Wind Project

Atlantic Shores Offshore Wind, LLC (Atlantic Shores) was a 50:50 joint venture partnership between Shell New Energies US LLC and EDF-RE Offshore Development, LLC (a subsidiary of EDF Renewables North America). In January 2024, Shell announced that it was withdrawing from the project. In February 2024, NJ announced that it would not proceed with its fourth offshore wind solicitation, under which Atlantic Shores had submitted a re-bid. EDF has now announced that it "has written down \$940 million in the project." NJ's Climate Change Lawsuit Against Oil Companies Dismissed

New U.S. Forestry and Agriculture GHG Inventory Dashboard

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has developed an interactive dashboard, updated annually, that allows users to explore emissions estimates from the agriculture and forestry sectors. It includes maps, graphs, and details by state and includes supplemental data that helps provide additional context about the drivers of those emissions. Data are included for Cropland Soils (N2O), Enteric Fermentation (CH4), Managed Livestock Waste (CH4 + N2O), Grazed Lands (CH4 + N2O), Rice Cultivation + Residue Burning (CH4 + N2O), Energy Use, Forests, Harvested Wood, Urban Trees, and Agricultural Soils. As of 2022, the inventory shows that NJ had -6.0 million metric tons of carbon dioxide emissions (net) from the agriculture and forestry sector. Heat Standards Advance for NJ Workplaces

We Are Killing Our Most Valuable Forests

This piece by the NJ Highlands Coalition Director of Policy and Communications describes the devastating effects on a NJ forest of the "Young Forest Initiative." "The state Department of Environmental Protection's Division of Fish and Wildlife receives funding from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Young Forest Initiative to create new forest edges deep into the Highland Core Forest, which purports to attract declining species of songbirds by nearly clear-cutting 10acre forest stands in locations throughout the 3,500-acre Sparta Mountain Wildlife Management Area. In a video investigation we made, 'Two Years After the Cut: Assessing the Regeneration of the Forest at Stand 9 on Sparta Mountain,' available on the NJ Highlands Coalition's You Tube Channel [available here:

LEAD REDUCTION IN HOUSEHOLDS

House Republicans Seek to Cancel Key Lead/Water Safety Rule that Will Replace All Toxic Lead Pipes in 10 Years, Protect Tens of Millions

A Joint Resolution (H.J.Res.44, available here: https://www.congress.gov/bill/119th-congress/housejoint-resolution/44) has been introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives entitled "Providing for congressional disapproval under chapter 8 of title 5, United States Code, of the rule submitted by the Environmental Protection Agency relating to 'National Primary Drinking Water Regulations for Lead and Copper: Improvements (LCRI)." It would repeal the requirements in the rules finalized by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in October 2024, which require the replacement of all toxic lead water pipes in most communities across the country within a decade, and also require more rigorous testing of drinking water and a lower threshold for requiring communities to take action against lead exposure in water. Jersey Water Works Issues Report: "Lessons Learned After Two Years of Accelerating Lead Service Line Replacement in New Jersey Communities"

From NJ Water Works: "As there is no safe level for lead exposure, water systems in New Jersey are working to meet the new statutory requirement to replace all lead service lines (LSL) by 2031. Despite progress, drinking water systems, governments, and stakeholders face numerous obstacles in complying with the legislation. Overcoming these challenges requires clear standards and communication, sustainable financing models, and education and outreach to property owners about the benefits of LSLR [lead service line replacement]. A comprehensive approach that includes more robust statewide guidance from the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP) and improved customer billing transparency is necessary to ensure the timely and successful replacement of LSLs, protect public health, and minimize health risks associated with lead in drinking water. EPA Investigates Warren County PFAS Hot Spot

From the mid-1950's to the mid-1970's, sludge containing PFAS ("forever chemicals"), from the Castle Creek Fabrics & Northern Dyeing Corporation mill in Washington Township, was spread on a 50-acre farm. Between 12,000 and 14,000 gallons of sludge was spread on the farm daily. It dried and was plowed into the soil, and then seeped into groundwater and private wells. Due to complicated geology, it may have reached the Musconetcong River. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is investigating, and is providing well testing. Amid Series of Rapid-Fire Policy Reversals, Trump Quietly Withdraws Proposed Limits on PFAS

As part of the new federal administration's freeze on issuance of new regulations, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Proposed Rule on "Clean Water Act Effluent Limitations Guidelines (ELG) and Standards for PFAS Manufacturers Under the Organic Chemicals, Plastics and Synthetic Fibers (OCSPF) Point Source Category" was withdrawn by the Office of Management and Budget (OMB). The rule had not been finalized; it had been sent to the White House for review in June 2024. The proposed rule "looks to limit the amount of PFAS ["forever chemicals"] discharged from PFAS manufacturing facilities, both directly into surface water and indirectly via Publicly Owned Treatment Works." New Jersey Receives Over \$185M in Energy Efficiency Grants for Low-and Moderate-Income Residents and Workforce Development

From the NJ Board of Utilities (BPU) press release: "The New Jersey Board of Public Utilities (NJBPU) has received over \$185M in federal funding from the Home Efficiency Rebates (HER or HOMES), Home Electrification and Appliance Rebates (HEAR or HEEHR), and Training for Residential Energy Contractors (TREC) programs from the United States Department of Energy (DOE). These grants, provided under the Biden Administration's Inflation Reduction Act (IRA), will fund energy efficiency and electrification programs for low-andmoderate-income communities, helping save money on utility bills, and bolster energy efficiency workforce development programs in New Jersey." [Note: similar grants have been reported in other states as having been "halted."]

Controversial Bill to Cut Plastic Packaging Advances

This 4-1/2-minute news video shows the ninth hearing in the Senate Environment Committee of a bill (S3398), the "Packaging and Paper Product Stewardship Act," that would require companies to cut plastic packaging by 50% over 10 years. Testimony of both supporters and opponents are shown; the bill was voted on at the hearing, and was approved. An identical bill (A5009) had not yet had a hearing in the Assembly.

NJ Republican Lawmaker Wants to Repeal Ban on Plastic Bags, Straws

A bill (A5338) has been introduced in the Assembly Environment, Natural Resources, and Solid Waste Committee that "Repeals law prohibiting sale or distribution of single-use plastic carryout bags, single-use paper carryout bags,

polystyrene foam food service products, and single-use plastic straws." The bill's sponsor, Assemblyman Azzariti Jr., stated that "New Jersey's 9 million residents started accumulating massive amounts of woven and reusable bags after the plastic bag ban went into effect. It became so overwhelming that these bags eventually ended up in the garbage, because they aren't recyclable or biodegradable. There's been no consensus on if the ban has worked, and in fact, there's only evidence to suggest that prohibiting single-use plastics may even have the opposite effect." A study released last year by the Freedonia Group is cited, which reported that New Jersey's anti-plastics law has been followed by a near tripling of plastic consumption. https://www.njassemblygop.com/CivicAlerts.aspx?AID
